*When submitting a manuscript to the editorial office, please adhere
to the following rules.*

For publication in the collection, the author submits the following documents to the editorial board:

1. An article in Russian, Belarusian, or English, with a length of 25,000 to 40,000 characters (including spaces), formatted in accordance with the formatting rules specified below. The materials must not have been previously published and must not be submitted for consideration and publication in another collection/journal. All articles are checked using the “Antiplagiat” system.

2. The article is accompanied by:

- an extract from the minutes of the department meeting with a recommendation for publication;
- 2 reviews of the publication (internal and external) – for graduate students;
- for graduate students, a review by the supervisor is required (printed, signed by the supervisor) with a recommendation for publication (it is mandatory to note the compliance of the publication with the rules for the design of the collection "Actual problems of International relations and Global Development").

ATTENTION

The review must include information about the use of artificial intelligence (AI), specifying the application, nature, and scope of the work performed with its help. For example: “When preparing the article to systematize literary sources, the OpenAI GPT-4 model (version dated 15.10.2025) was used. Main prompts: ‘Systematize the key studies on the topic... over the past 5 years’, ‘Identify the main methodological approaches in...’. All conclusions and analytical generalizations presented in the work were made by the author independently.” The student and the academic supervisor sign the review.

It is unacceptable to generate textual information using AI to include it in one’s own intellectual products (essays, articles, abstracts, term papers, theses, dissertations, and scientific papers). The use of AI is limited to processing text to improve grammar, style, and clarity, with the mandatory indication of this fact and the provision of a prompt.

The review is signed by the student and the academic supervisor.

It is unacceptable to generate textual information using AI for inclusion in one’s own intellectual products (essays, articles, summaries, term papers, theses, dissertations, and scientific papers). The use of AI is limited to processing text to

improve grammar, style, and clarity, with the mandatory indication of this fact and the provision of a prompt.

3. The article should include:

- information about the article in English (title; initials and surname, academic degree and title of the author; the organization they represent; abstract (150–200 words), keywords; citation sample; author(s));
- information about the article in Russian;
- the text of the article.

It is recommended to divide the text of the article into parts and title them as follows:

- Introduction
- Methods
- Literature review on the topic
- Results
- Discussion of results (if necessary)
- Conclusion
- Acknowledgments
- references (list of literature). Placed at the end of the scientific article; numbered in the order of their citation in the text.

4. All information must be submitted electronically in .doc or .docx format. **All information is sent in one file.** The last name of the author must be indicated in the file name: Ivanov.doc or ИВАНОВ.doc.

5. For publication in the 14th issue of the collection (to be published in 2026), the required set of documents must be submitted by 02 October 2026 via email to centis@bsu.by.

THE DECISION TO PUBLISH THE ARTICLE IS MADE BY THE EDITORIAL BOARD. PUBLICATIONS ARE FREE OF CHARGE.

GENERAL REQUIREMENTS FOR PUBLICATION

Article must:

- be relevant and correspond to the subject of the collection;
- be an independent study;
- be based on the works of domestic and foreign specialists and contain relevant references (at least 10).

The manuscript is provided in the .doc or .docx format. The page format is A4, Times New Roman font 16 pt, margins – 2 cm on each side, indent of the first line – 1.25; distance between lines – 1 interval.

The volume of the article should not exceed 15–18 pages, including text, References and up to 5 non-text objects (diagrams, photographs, tables). The

orientation of the pages is bookish. References, as well as page footnotes: font 12, line spacing 1, without indent.

INFORMATION ABOUT THE ARTICLE

TITLE. Center alignment in BOLD UPPERCASE letters. The title of the article should be as brief as possible and not repeat the topic of the dissertation research.

AUTHOR. Initials and surname: center alignment, BOLD UPPERCASE ITALICS.

AFFILIATION – in italics. The title of the work and information about the author(s) (place of work) are given at the beginning of the article and are drawn up STRICTLY according to the following pattern:

Abstract. (200–250 words). A direct copy of a Russian-language abstract is unacceptable.

Key words (up to 10 words).

THE TEXT OF THE ARTICLE. The design of the text of the article: Times New Roman font 14 pt, margins – 2 cm on each side, the indent of the first line – 1.25; the distance between the lines – 1 interval. Up to 5 non-text objects (diagrams, photos, tables) are allowed. The text of the article should be divided into logical parts containing subheadings (See point 3).

TECHNICAL REQUIREMENTS FOR MATERIALS.

Quotation mark pattern: “text”. Do not confuse the hyphen (-), dash (–), and minus (−) signs. It is necessary to use a short dash (–); a dash is placed between the digits without spaces. For example: 1–2, XX–XXI.

Decimal numbers should be specified with a comma, not with a dot. For example: 1,5 times.

When writing initials, it is necessary to use an unbroken space (CTRL+SHIFT+Space). For example: A. A. Yankovsky, A. V. Alexandrov.

TABLES. The word Table 1 is written in italics and placed in a separate line on the right, font 12 pt.; the name of the table is printed in a straight font 12 pt. on the next line on the right; the dot is not necessary. You should not go horizontally outside the table. The names of the graph tables (header) are drawn in a straight font of 12 pt., the text in the cells is centered. The body of the table is designed in font 12 pt. At the bottom, the tables are separated from the main text by an interval of 6 pt. If the article contains one table, then it is not numbered and the word “Table” is not put in the title. Example:

Table 1 provides examples of letters from the Greek alphabet.

Source: [12, pp. 23–24]. The source is separated from the bottom border of the table and the subsequent text by one blank line.

All highlighting in the text is done in *italics only* (not in bold or underlined).

REFERENCES (LIST OF LITERATURE). References to sources are placed at the end of the scientific article and are numbered in the order in which they are cited in the text [1, p. 2], [3; 4], [5; 6, p. 7], etc.; if necessary, page numbers are indicated. If a reference includes several sources, they are separated by a semicolon within the square brackets: [4, p. 15; 5, p. 123]. ***Contains only scientific publications, at least 10.***

Parameters: font size — 12 kg, style — light, upright, alignment — justified, paragraph indentation — 10 mm, line spacing — single.

NOTA BENE! Normative documents (resolutions, laws, instructions, etc.), lecture courses, textbooks that are hard-to-access, unpublished as well as local and popular sources: dissertations and abstracts of dissertations, newspaper materials, unpublished reports are issued in the form of page footnotes.

If the journal gives a citation sample of its articles, this information should be used. You cannot arbitrarily shorten the names of journals. You can check the recommended abbreviation in the ISSN center's list: List of Title World Abbreviations (LTWA) <http://www.issn.org/services/online-services/access-to-the-ltwa/>. If there are no recommendations for reduction, their full spelling should be given. You cannot specify the name of the journal by an abbreviation if it is not provided by the journal.
